Top Events

There were 2 exciting events this year, one of which was the introduction of 16 buffalo - It is hoped this will eventually make a huge difference to the grassland. They seem to have decided Ithala is the place for them and hopefully they will move around more during the winter looking for juicier grass!

The ostrich parents lost all the chicks in early 2023, they had another 10 chicks, of which 3 have been spotted.

In 2024, a list will be put together of animals to take off and animals to bring in so as to stay well within UmPhafa's carrying capacity – the animals taken off will include zebra, kudu and wildebeest bulls.

GAME COUNTS

Despite having an increase in figures in 2022 of 500 animals on the Reserve, 2023 has seen a reduction of 400 animals. We know this is partly due to losing a lot of the elderly, sick animals in the 4th quarter - with little rain there was not much nourishment as the rains were delayed, only starting properly in November.

Even with the use of an increased number of licks, we were getting to the stage of considering the purhase of hay bales. Luckily the rain came eventually in November. The number of babies recorded is considerably less as the animals seem to wait for better conditions. The wildebeest and impala only gave birth after Christmas – maybe they knew something we didn't!

• One blue crane pair was spotted with one chick on Ithala. Jan 2023

• A leopard was captured within the community and taken to Phinda.

• The team met with the community to discuss cheetah and buffalo introductions.

• The first case of Foot & Mouth was reported in Colenso.

Feb 2023 • The Esri license was received for free for the Ceres animal tags.

• Several grey crowned cranes were seen on the rye field performing their dances.

• We finally received the Adequate Fence Enclosure Certificate.

Mar 2023 • A community meeting was held where the introduction of cheetah and buffalo were signed off.

• 3 wild dogs left for Pongola to be bonded with 2 females after being in the boma for 87 days.

May 2023 • The State Vet came to check the buffalo fences in order for us to receive the buffalo permit.

> • The Giraffe Conservation Foundation joined us for a few days to take DNA samples from our giraffe to establish the sub species – a report is to be produced in 2024.

• The Cheetah Advisory Committee visited to chat all things cheetah for the first time.

• Panthera put out 12 trail cameras to try to establish the leopard corridor between Weenan,

UmPhafa, Tugela Game Ranch and Zingela – several pictures of leopards, including a female with 2 cubs around the boma area, have been captured – a report is to follow.

• Potentially 2 secretary birds were spotted nesting.

• So far in 2023, 6 new giraffe babies have been counted.

· An aerial game count was completed.

• 16 African buffalo were purchased.

· Panthera came to remove camera traps.

• The Cheetah Advisory Committee came to inspect UmPhafa so that their support can be given to our cheetah permit.

• A 5-year cheetah management plan completed and sent to the Permits Office.

• 16 African buffalo were delivered; 4 males, 12 females. Nov 2023

Interns on UmPhafa built owl nesting boxes.

• A leopard was captured in the community and taken to Dinokeng Reserve near Pretoria. Dec 2023

• Female leopard Chewy was spotted with 2 new cubs.





RAINFALL

2022 was a record year for rain, however 2023 has not been so wet, with the rains only starting properly in November. This caused concern for the animals and quite a few ill and elderly animals who could not cope with the lack of nourishment did not survive. Despite an increased numbers of licks being put out, there were worries this would not be sufficient food so the purchasing of hay bales was considered.

2023 saw the loss of fencing in Quarter 1 & 4 only – perhaps people shopping for Christmas as it all seemed to be around that time! An estimated cost for the lost fence, including the expense of repairing holes by animals and poachers, amounts to approx. R7040 (£300). At an average rate of R1000 per animal lost, R19000 (£800) in animals has been lost to poaching, but this could be much higher as we can only confirm if we see evidence – often animals are put in bags for easy removal.

Following on from the shooting of sports hunting dogs in December 2022, the year has seen a decrease in this species being taken, with only 6 being shot this year. Fewer animals on the reserve also impacts the poachers' ability to hunt for the animals. However, 3 spears, a hat and several pairs of gloves and pliers have been left behind by the poachers. The animals have also continued to damage and make holes in the fence which is very time consuming for the rangers to fix.

In December 2023 a different approach was taken by poachers to make large holes in the fence and then lay molasses outside the fence to entice the animals out – it is believed these sites were discovered before any animals were lost.

• The Mahindra vehicle was sold as repairs were regularly carried due to the heavy work driving on the roads – it was not solid enough for the work needed!

• Tropical Cyclone Freddy damaged the rangers' tent on Ithala and a tree fell down on the roof of the rangers' bathroom.

Apr 2023 • Wildlife Protection Services donated 3 solar camera traps.

• A new vehicle was purchased for the field rangers – an old landrover capable of navigating the tricky terrain and reaching all areas of the Reserve.

Transnet Pipeline Security group gave a demonstration on the use of their thermal drone
which they use to check for poachers along their oil pipeline. We have an arrangement
where they will help with poaching incidents along the N3 or even inside
the Reserve if required.

A solar camera trap was taken by poachers despite being attached to a tree –
 Douglas from the Maintenance team designed and built metal cages for all our camera traps which are now chained to trees making them more difficult to remove

 Work started on dismantling the old N3 Ranger outpost damaged by the Tropical Cyclone Freddy in February.

• Firearm training was started ready for the actual training and practical assessments later in the month - these consisted of 3 theory papers and 2 practical assessments. Training about buffalo and birds was also given.

• New rangers Thabani and Nkosinathi started and Zwelisha left.

• The N3 outpost was almost completed, but it is able to be used over Christmas.



Interns

53 interns were hosted at Sully this year, which included groups from Writtle University College, University of Suffolk and East Coast College. A new Student Intern, Luhan, was recruited and was made permanent once Cameron left half way through the year.

Feedback on the programme has been good this year and some interns have been lucky enough to see the rhino dehorning, experience game capture, which included a flip in a helicopter, spend the day with Rigardt collecting giraffe DNA samples and witness the release of the buffalo, which were all highlights. The interns have also carried out a variety of maintenance tasks, including making up animal licks, road repair, painting fence poles, building owl nest boxes, alien plant clearing, tackling bush encroachment, and much more.

MAINTENANCE

• 60m of gabion was built along the Roosboom boundary fence. Jan 2023

• A fence between agricultural land and the community was erected to establish boundaries.

• Maintenance Manager Mark's water storage reservoir was renovated.

• Repairs were completed on the rebuilt fire trailer and tanker.

• Retaining walls were built at Mark's workshop and a trench dug at Elworthy to aid the flow of water away from properties.

• A herbicide cage was built at the side of Mark's property to ensure herbicides are locked away at all times.

· A Padfoot roller was received.

• With Tropical Cyclone Freddy hitting the area, lots of road, fence and tree removals were required.

· A drunk driver hit the R103 fence line.

• 2 bedrooms were tiled at Sully House.

• The Sully House garage was completed with bamboo.

• Perimeter burns were started for wild fire control. May 2023

• The herbicide room was built at Elworthy.

• Perimeter burns were finished.

• The pipe to the wetlands area on the rye field was changed to increase flow of water pumped from river.

• The TLB tractor was damaged and was sent for repairs – the trailer hit a bridge breaking the arm.

• Fire breaks were burnt around a neighbouring property.

• Fence N3 corner was replaced - a prime poaching spot.

• 6 gabions were built across the Reserve to aid in reducing erosion.

• Bush camp improvements were carried out.

• The staff kitchen had a makeover with paint and tiles to protect the walls when cooking, and in the sink area, and the next room was knocked through in order to give more space.

• A Reserve clean up was carried out over a few days.

- · More gabions were built.
- A wild fire was put out by the community and another from a lightening strike on Ithala.
- Gas cylinder cage was constructed a legal requirement for the storage of gas.
- An old trailer was renovated for use by the interns.
- A new access gate was installed at the foot and mouth trough at Elworthy for larger vehicles.
- The clearance of Acacia Karoo plants from around Elworthy began.
- New solar houses were built ready for installation of inverters and batteries.
- The dismantling of the N3 outpost got underway.
- 100m of fence line was relocated back away from the Tugela River as there was a lot of erosion.
- Foundations were completed for the N3 ranger outpost.
- The new buffalo fence was started on the perimeter of Tugela Steel to prevent the buffaloes fighting through the fence.
- The clearing of Acacia Karoo continued.
- A wild fire was put in by the community.
- Another drunk driver crashed into the R103 fence.
- The boma was cleared and repaired, ready for wild dogs arriving in the future.
- The installation of new solar houses was completed and stands for the solar panels were also built.
- The fence line was sprayed as the weeds are affecting the electrical supply.
- A wild fire was put in by the community.
- The clearing of Acacia Karoo around Elworthy continued.
- Another car crashed into the fence line, but did little damage this was due to rain on the R103
- A buffalo offloading ramp was built in readiness for their arrival in November.
- Large areas of ground was burnt (block burns).
- The Sully borehole pump was taken out as there was no water in the 140m well. From now on, daily trips will be taken to fill up the water tanks at Sully from Elworthy.
- Work continued on the N3 outpost.
- Dec 2023 The N3 outpost is now 95% completed

• 6 ladies were employed from the community to be alien plant destroyers for 3 months. Jan 2023

• The team met with the neighbouring Indunas to talk about buffalo and cheetah.

• Riots began in Roosboom due to no electric or water for many days.

Feb 2023 Colenso had its first Foot and Mouth case.

Mar 2023 • The community signed off on introducing cheetah and buffalo to the Reserve.

> 2 tanker loads of water were delivered to the Roosboom Community as, again, there was no water.

Aug 2023 • The Reserve also gave Mdekane water as the river is very low.

> • A student from Michaelhouse school joined us to complete 16 hrs of community work, which was spent clearing the R103 of rubbish collecting 16 bags and 6 bakkie (small truck) loads to be destroyed.

• KwaZulu-Natal University joined us again for a week to carry out soil surveys. In total, 35 students and teachers came.

· Luhan, as part of his practical assessment, went to Mulukmahomed Lappa Sultan (ML Sultan) school to run an education session for 350 children about recycling.

 Reserve Manager Amanda contacted Unisa to discuss potential opportunities for the students to come to UmPhafa to complete practical sessions.

• The Reserve recruited 6 ladies for Lantana to help with clearances again.

• There were riots again in Roosboom due to the lack of water and electrics, and a road was closed.

• Mdekane finished her numbers at an all time record low, having sold her bull and some of her goats.
